

# Visit the Eiffel Tower: The Ultimate Paris Experience

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It may come as a surprise that the Eiffel Tower was never intended to remain in Paris permanently. When construction began in 1887, the ambitious project was designed as the centerpiece of the Exposition Universelle of 1889, celebrating the centennial of the French Revolution.

The organizers wanted a spectacular entrance that would demonstrate France's industrial strength and engineering expertise. Gustave Eiffel's proposal, developed alongside talented engineers Maurice Koechlin and Émile Nouguier and architect Stephen Sauvestre, offered precisely that: a revolutionary iron tower unlike anything the world had ever seen.

At nearly 1,000 feet tall when completed, it instantly became the tallest structure ever built by humans. No cathedral, monument, or skyscraper had previously reached such heights.

Construction itself represented an extraordinary logistical achievement. More than 300 workers assembled over 18,000 prefabricated iron components using approximately 2.5 million rivets. Remarkably, despite the scale of the project, safety standards were exceptionally advanced for the era, resulting in very few serious accidents.

Completed in just over two years, the Eiffel Tower officially opened in March 1889, astonishing visitors from around the world with its unprecedented size and daring design.

Yet success was far from guaranteed.

## A Monument That Paris Almost Rejected

Long before becoming the symbol of France, the Eiffel Tower was one of the most controversial construction projects in Parisian history.

Many of the city's leading artists, architects, writers, and intellectuals fiercely opposed the project. They argued that the immense iron structure would permanently disfigure the elegant skyline of Paris.

A famous public petition denounced what critics described as a "gigantic black factory chimney" dominating the capital. Among the signatories were some of the most respected cultural figures of the late nineteenth century.

Newspapers published passionate debates. Some Parisians admired the engineering achievement, while others viewed it as an industrial monstrosity incompatible with the city's classical beauty.

Gustave Eiffel remained remarkably confident. He believed future generations would judge the tower not only by its appearance but by its technical brilliance and scientific usefulness.

History proved him right.

Within just a few decades, public opinion had completely changed. Visitors from across Europe began associating Paris with the remarkable iron tower rising above the Seine. Photographers, painters, filmmakers, and writers adopted it as the visual signature of the French capital.

Today, imagining Paris without the Eiffel Tower has become almost impossible.

## Why the Eiffel Tower Was Saved from Demolition

When the Eiffel Tower opened in 1889, few people imagined it would still dominate the Paris skyline more than a century later. In fact, its original operating permit was limited to just twenty years. According to the agreement signed with the French authorities, the structure was expected to be dismantled around 1909 once the World's Fair had become a distant memory.

As that deadline approached, the future of the monument remained uncertain. Maintaining such a massive iron structure required significant resources, and many critics still considered it an eyesore rather than a masterpiece.

Gustave Eiffel understood that the tower needed to prove its usefulness if it were to survive. Rather than allowing it to become little more than a tourist curiosity, he encouraged scientists to use it as a laboratory suspended high above Paris.

Meteorologists conducted atmospheric observations from its upper platforms. Physicists carried out experiments on gravity and air resistance. Engineers studied wind pressure at unprecedented heights. These scientific activities demonstrated that the tower offered unique research opportunities impossible to reproduce elsewhere.

Its greatest contribution, however, came with the rapid development of wireless communications. The Eiffel Tower became an ideal location for radio transmission antennas, helping France establish one of Europe's most advanced communication networks during the early twentieth century.

Military authorities soon recognized its strategic importance. During the First World War, radio transmissions sent from the tower played a vital role in military communications, contributing directly to the French war effort.

By proving its scientific and military value, the Eiffel Tower escaped demolition and gradually transformed from a temporary exhibition structure into a permanent national monument.

Every year, technicians perform extensive inspections and maintenance to ensure exceptional reliability while preserving the tower's historic character.

## Keeping the Iron Lady Beautiful

Maintaining a monument exposed to weather throughout the year requires constant attention. The Eiffel Tower is far from a static structure—it is a living monument cared for by teams of highly specialized engineers, painters, metalworkers, and technicians.

Perhaps its most famous maintenance operation is the complete repainting of the tower, carried out approximately every seven years. Tens of thousands of square meters of iron must be carefully cleaned, inspected, and repainted by hand.

Far from using a single uniform color, the tower is actually painted in three slightly different shades. Darker tones appear at the base while progressively lighter shades are applied toward the summit, creating an optical effect that enhances the monument's elegant proportions against the Parisian sky.

Visitors are often surprised to learn that dozens of skilled painters work suspended high above the ground using ropes and safety equipment to reach every section of the iron framework.

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## Why wasn't the Eiffel Tower demolished after the 1889 World's Fair?
